 - o Christina Lounsbury reviewed the quarterly report of October, November, and December 2022. There were a total of 4 complaints made by 4 complainants. The year-end noise



report included new graphics and tables. It was noted that both operations and noise calls were down for the year. There were two households making complaints from Barnstable village that were new. There was nothing violating any procedures, and the citizens were educated on the flight path (they were misinformed about this), the actual altitude of the aircraft in question. Details were emailed to the Commissioners. The new graphics will be included on the quarterly reports as well. There were no complaints for the aircraft that were here for the Presidential visit.

 EVO-Jet Services / EVO Fuels LLC has requested to contract with the Airport to supply jet fuel at a discounted rate as outlined in the Cape Cod Gateway Airport Discount Jet Fuel Purchase Program.

 EVO has elected to enter into the SILVER PROGRAM - Multiple Cumulative Purchases without an annual minimum purchase agreement.

 Discounted prices are available and awarded only when the Gallons/Uplift (see Schedule B below - SILVER PROGRAM) is achieved.

- Increasing discounts are available upon reaching each successive tier level the more fuel purchased, the higher the Discount Rate once the tier level is reached.
- EVO has been purchasing fuel from the Airport for over two years and was not previously interested in the discount program.
- This agenda item was unanimously approved by verbal vote.

COM0123-2 Monthly Update Airport Business Plan for FY2023

• Manager Servis reviewed the highlighted revisions of the Business Plan Update Memo dated 12/28/22 that was previously provided to the Infrastructure Subcommittee.



• She discussed the Airport Community Event Series to include the following:

 A Scout sleepover in the Terminal in March for a group of 35 scouts from Hopedale, Massachusetts. An outline of what was done in the prior sleepovers was reviewed.

Another Airplane and Cigar event on the Tarmac in May or June. This was a successful

event last year. This is a unique way to get people to come to the Airport.

o An Electric Aviation Conference to showcase future Electric Aviation possibilities. An Exhibitor list, speakers, and presentations would need to be assembled. Archer Aviation will be holding their East Coast event this year in Washington DC. and Beta already has their plans in place for CY2023 so both have declined to attend a Cape Cod visit. Archer may be able to attend the September events to showcase their EA efforts.

o A series of Hangars & Hamburgers events are scheduled for over the summer months

to bring in General Aviation participants.

o The two larger events, Southeastern Massachusetts Aviation Career Fair and A Great Day at the Gateway, will be scheduled for the same weekend on September 23rd and 24th. A meeting will be held to request volunteers to work at each event.

November/December holiday themed events have yet to be determined.

Chairman Griffin thought it was remarkable that the scout troop was from so far away.
 They had learned about the prior overnight visit from a media post and requested an overnight. Commissioner Flores requested that Manager Servis reach out to the Cape Cod & Islands Boy Scouts of America Council.

Manager Servis will be attending the NBAA Schedulers & Dispatchers Conference in Tennessee to showcase the airport and to determine the best method of exhibiting at

future events. The draft brochure for the event was reviewed.

The Jet Fuel Discount Program annual contract with Everest has been completed and the

contract is in progress with NetJets.

Land Leases and Hangar development are moving forward with Ben deRuyter, and a lease
has been finalized with Aloft Aviation. The Massachusetts Air and Space Museum (MASM)
has pulled out of the potential lease for the building at 110 Mary Dunn Way, and Marine
Lumber/ Aero Management would like to tear down and build a larger hangar to fit their
aircraft.

Chris Bostwick gave a brief overview of the status of the projects in process and supplied

photos of the Operations Building rehabilitation.

Website updates have been completed with information on advertisement, the
Environmental Assessment, and business development. Possible transportation to and from
the MASM on Main Street, new High School interns, the Suffolk Construction lease for
parking on the Mildred's site (modified planting plan was reviewed), and the addition of
signage on the Air Traffic Control Tower.

A quarterly newsletter is under development.

COM0123-3 Electric Aviation Update

 Management met with Cape Air, Archer Aviation, BETA Aviation, and the MassDOT on January 9th with representatives from the Nantucket, Martha's Vineyard, and Boston airports attending.

Development of an Electric Aviation Task Force is underway.

 Archer Aviation wants to proceed with commercial aviation. They have agreements in place with United Airlines and have been talking with Cape Air and some other airlines. They are looking to the airports to implement the infrastructure needed.

Management suggested that the Cape & Island airports collectively solicit potential grants
that would allow for a group of airports to apply for more of a regional approach to funding.

Archer will work with the airports that have the infrastructure in place. A universal plug-in is being worked on for all EA to be able to use the same equipment.



- BETA is interested in moving forward with a charging station adjacent to the Air Cape Cod facility on the East Ramp. Management is working on an initial 10 year lease document and is exploring the best way to implement "flowage fees" or gross revenue fees.
- Commissioner Weill commented on the viability of the Archer company and the fast pace of EA development.
- The construction of the BETA unit will help identify what will be needed for future EA.

Tom"	Emailed: Good morning Tom – Thank you for reaching out regarding the aircraft yesterday morning. The flight was actually a Piper Navajo PA-31, not Cape Air at 775 feet flying VFR in our voluntary noise abatement flight path and departing from Rwy 06. I will record the noise complaint for the report. Hope you have a great holiday season! Christina	Caller reported, "Aircraft this morning was very loud from 7:30-7:45. It seemed a lot louder than usual."	Spoke with caller and reported that the aircraft were in the voluntary noise abatement flight path, and at a higher than normal altitude. After speaking with her for while and she agreed that this should be reported as loud, as the pilots were following the correct path and altitudes.	Citizen emailed, "I live at 57 Rudder Road in Barnstable and am asking that the airplane noise over my house be significantly reduced. It is an unfair noise situation for many of us living along this flight path as it disturbs our peace and wakes us up at 6:30am many mornings. Of those seven days listed above, I found one departure on Wednesday, December 14, 2022 at 6:49 a.m. that we went over your area at 925 feet. This flight was at a higher than required altitude and was following the correct flight path.	With the results of my review, there isn't a specific issue that can be addressed with the airlines or pilots. They are in compliance with their altitude, our voluntary noise abatement flight path and our voluntary curfew. I know this is not the answer you would like to hear and unfortunately the airport does not have the authority to make the changes you request. I would be happy to speak with you further and/or research any other dates or times of flights that you are concerned about. 




2022 Year-end Noise Report

During the calendar year 2022, noise disturbances from surrounding communities totaled 39 calls which was a decrease of 61 calls from 2021. Operations for 2022 totaled 53,569 which was a decrease of 4,792 (approximately an 8% decrease in traffic) from 2021.






A majority of the callers registered one single complaint, representing about 50% of our noise calls. Caller A registered 12 calls (approximately 30%) of our total calls. This caller is a new caller and lives close in proximity to the airport. The air traffic from Runway 15/33 affects their area and their major areas of reported concern were low, off course and frequency of operations. Investigating these air traffic concerns, I did not find any flights with low altitudes and noted this area is actually in the flight path despite the callers stating they were informed to the contrary. Caller B from the Centerville area has been a frequent caller over the past decade.




The next graph reviews the caller's type of disturbance. The majority of complaints reference either an aircraft flying off course or the aircraft's altitude being too low. The other concerns were the time of day (flying during our voluntary noise abatement curfew hours), the volume of air traffic or the noise level. Starting in the third quarter of 2022, the

Airport has added a column to the monthly noise report that indicates a final conclusion of the reported disturbance. For example, if the caller indicates an aircraft was low and loud over their area, the airport would research the path and if it was not low in altitude I will indicate that the disturbance type will be noise (not altitude). This marks a change from the previous reporting method of labeling the cause solely by what was indicated by caller by including the final determination with the flight tracking system. The 2023 year-end noise report will reflect this change.




During 2022, the majority of disturbances being reported during normal waking/business hours with roughly 77% of the total disturbance outside of the Airport's voluntary noise abatement curfew (6:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m.). During our voluntary noise curfew hours, 10:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m., the percentage of total calls was 23%.



For calls of disturbance by month, the numbers fluctuated month to month during 2022. There was the usual increase with the summer season traffic, but there was an uptick during the month of March without a specific reason noted for this increase.

Calls by area of concern indicated an increase from the village of Barnstable with 19 calls for disturbance up from 3 call in 2021. This area, which was addressed earlier in the report, had two residents from Barnstable, north of the airport and in the flight path of Runway 15/33, that were new to the airport noise office. The other calls came Town of Yarmouth (8), the village of Centerville (8) and the village of Hyannis (4).



For 2022, Cape Cod Gateway Airport saw a decrease in air traffic as well as a decrease in calls for disturbance. Airport staff addressed these concerns by providing information from the flight tracking system, reaching out to the airline tenants to share the concerns reported and to explain the actual traffic amounts, altitudes and air traffic paterns every citizens who reached out to the airport.

In 2023, Cape Cod Gateway Airport will see construction on Runway 06/24 and the EMAS system which will substantially decrease air traffic for some neighbors, but increase for those in the 15/33 flight paths. It is our hope that with contined public outreach and consistent noise abatement response, the Airport can help those effected by this temporary change with information and education as during the Runway 15/33 contruction. Additionally I can not stress enough how important our airport flight tracking system continues to be such a worthwhile investment. This option continually allows the public an option to view live flight tracks (with a 10 minute security delay) as well as historical flight tracking that allows citizens a 24/7 airport tracking portal. The continued funding for this portal by Airport Management and the Airport Commission a vital tool for our continued success in noise abatement and community transparency.



Annual Jet-A Fuel Sales by Fiscal Year




Monthly Jet-A Fuel Sales by Fiscal Year








FY2023 Airport Operations/Passenger Activity
