

Town Council Meeting March 2, 2023



A quorum being duly present, President Matthew Levesque called the March 2, 2023, Town Council meeting to order at 7:04 PM.

An announcement was made by President Levesque regarding the meeting being televised live and questioning if anyone was actively taping the session to please make their presence known. This session is recorded and broadcast on Channel 18.

The Pledge of Allegiance was led by President Levesque followed by a moment of silence for the people of Ukraine.

PUBLIC COMMENT:

(In-person)

Debra Dagwan came to speak about the Dockside project, the harbor is very special to us, have some concerns about giving waivers, we have seen other developments. We need affordable units in Hyannis near the harbor.

Paul Phalan bringing attention to the Twin Books apartments, stands with his neighbors. The housing crisis affects so many; older residents have no place to downsize in an affordable house. We have 750 acres in Barnstable that are underutilized. We could have a multiuse facility up by the airport.

Wendy Crocker could someone report on the property at 310 Main Street that is rotting. It is not bringing in any revenue for our town.

Councilor Response to Public Comment:

(Ludtke) thank you for the comments, we are going to lose the continuity of our harbor, the Planning Board is working on it. The airport is underutilized, we don't need to legthen our runways. There is a pilot shortage maybe we should bring back pilot training. 310 Main Street has a nice little yard, we should make it an affordable. (Schnepp) Appreciate the viewpoint on what the Dockside project means to the residents of Hyannis; interesting ideas investing in the airport, we do get a lot of money from the FAA; maybe there are other alternatives. (Rapp Grassetti) I have concerns on that project, but will wait until it comes before the Council, for me it is a lost opportunity, would like to see a mixed use development. The airport does have a lot of empty space, however, the airport is an enterprise account. (Shaughnessy) regarding the dockside project, I can't picture a four story building in that spot. I encourage everyone in the

community to share your ideas for housing. (Cullum) Reputation matters, we will have a lively discussion about that when it comes before us (Neary) When it comes down to the airport project, the FAA doesn't allow for 2nd story buildings for housing.

Town Manager Ells spoke to the 310 Main Street property, will take it under review, we have been working closely with the people of Centerville and Councilor Atsalis. We do not want to release that property as yet. The Department of Public Works (DPW) does maintain the property.

People will be given an opportunity to bid, will sit down with the highest bidder (Schnepp) How will people know there is an RFP process (Anthony) We notify the abutters, will send letters, these parcels are going to be interesting to the abutters. (Schnepp) the affordable parcel in Marstons Mills is there still conversation of what can be built on that property (Anthony) We think home ownership is the way to go, we will be flexible with this RFP; (Schnepp) Locations of wireless regulations how will this be enforced (Ells) A town manager regulation that will be enforced by our building commissioner, I will get back to you on that (Shaughnessy) Thank you to the police and fire departments for providing the first aid awareness to the community. (Starr) Did you have a meeting today with the DPW (Ells) that is tomorrow (Levesque) Thanks to the staff for getting the golf course open and handling the flooding situation at the Hyannis Golf Course (Levesque) question in how we are going to handle the sewer hook ups (Santos) there is some misinformation about a mistake in the sewer system, in this project the sewer system is very deep which may cost the home owner more money to hook up. The deeper the sewer it makes a better hook up, every person can connect; we are putting through an RFP; we will seek an appropriation for the risers. (Ludtke) Appreciate the information, we have come up with the best solution.

(Schnepp) is there any time frame to expend the funds (Santos) we have worked that into our project (Starr) so we are going to pull it all out (Santos) Yes (Starr) if we have a high tide will it stop the water (Santos) that is the intention (Cullum) looking forward to this project, there are a lot of people very interested in the harbor but there is no place for boats to rehab, so many opportunities (Santos) we will seek that input.

2023-139 ORDER APPROVING AN AMENDMENT TO THE 1992, 1995 AND 1997 AGREEMENTS BETWEEN THE TOWN AND THE WOODS HOLE, MARTHA'S VINEYARD AND NANTUCKET STEAMSHIP AUTHORITY INTRO: 3/2/2023

Upon a motion duly made and seconded it was

ORDERED: That the Town Council does hereby authorize the Town Manager to negotiate and execute an Amendment to the July 16, 1992 Agreement, the February 27, 1995 Memorandum of Understanding Relative to the Agreement dated as of July 16, 1992, and the November 6, 1997 Amendment to the Agreements Dated July 16, 1992 and February 27, 1995, between the Woods Hole, Martha's Vineyard and Nantucket Steamship Authority (the "SSA") and the Town of Barnstable ("Town") (collectively, the "Agreements"), to increase the permitted maximum overall length of any of the SSA's vessels to two hundred forty-five feet (245'); provided that the execution of such Amendment shall be contingent on said Amendment expressly including language in which the Town and the SSA agree to work collaboratively to consolidate the Agreements and the Amendment authorized herein into one new agreement which would supersede and replace those separate agreements (the "Superseding Agreement"). Such consolidation would be for administrative convenience only to reflect in one document the current terms and conditions of those individual agreements and to remove outdated, expired, and/or superseded language. The Town Manager is hereby authorized to negotiate and execute the Superseding Agreement as described herein.

2023-140 APPROPRIATION ORDER IN THE AMOUNT OF \$34,500 FOR BURIAL EQUIPMENT FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS CEMETERY PROGRAM INTRO: 3/2/2023

Upon a motion duly made and seconded it was

ORDERED: That the sum of **\$34,500** be appropriated for the Department of Public Works Structures & Grounds Division Cemetery Program for the purpose of purchasing burial equipment used by Town staff to maintain cemeteries and perform interments in Town

cemeteries, and to meet such Appropriation, that **\$34,500** be provided from the Town's Sale of Cemetery Lots Special Revenue Fund.

moved to go into executive session pursuant to G.L. c. 30A, sec. 21(a)(3) to discuss strategy with respect to litigation since a discussion in open session may have a detrimental effect on the litigating position of the Town and Town Council. Specifically, the Council will discuss a Notice of Intent to File Suit dated February 16, 2023 sent by the Conservation Law Foundation to the Town regarding claims under the federal Clean Water Act. The Council will not return to public session after the executive session.
