

In Memoriam – Royden Richardson

Former Town Council President Royden C Richardson (Reverend Richardson), loving husband, father and grandfather, passed away peacefully with his family by his side on Sunday, August 1, 2021. Roy had a distinguished record of public service. In 1970, Roy and his wife Jackie, moved their young family to Cape Cod, and Roy continued his work serving others. Roy was a member of the Barnstable Town Council from 1993-2005,

President 1999-2000. It was during Roy's time as Town Council President that the Town of Barnstable flag was created by art students at Barnstable High School. He served as the Cape Cod Commission member for the Town of Barnstable. Roy was a board member of the following agencies: Community Action Council of the Cape and Islands, Salvation Army Advisory Board, Barnstable Economic Development Committee, Hyannis Historic District Study Committee, Barnstable Architectural Review Committee, State Head Injured Program Advisory Board, Cape Counseling Center, Osterville Rotary Club, NAACP Education Counseling Committee, Friends of Prisoners, and Centerville Historic Museum. Roy loved all things Centerville and the Town of Barnstable. He was instrumental in re-establishing Centerville Old Home Week and he especially



enjoyed the Moonlighters and bonfire held on Craigville beach during that week. Roy frequently quoted John Wesley by saying: "Do all the good you can, by all the means you can, in all the ways you can, in all the places you can, at all the times you can, to all the people you can, as long as ever you can". This is how Roy lived his life. We extend our deepest sympathy to Roy's wife Jackie and their children, grandchildren and great grandchildren.

Special Town Council Meeting – Thursday, August 5, 2021

The <u>August 5, 2021 Town Council Meeting</u> of the Barnstable Town Council was conducted remotely and physically closed to the public. Alternative public access was provided through Zoom. Town Council President Matt Levesque opened the meeting by inviting Town Councilor Tracy Shaughnessy to lead the Pledge of Allegiance. President Levesque offered the Moment of Silence in honor of Former Town Council President Royden Richardson (see article above). Next up was Public Comment and Council Response to Public Comment. This was followed by the Commander's update on Joint Base Cape Cod activities with Colonel Sean Riley, Commander ANG 102d; Lieutenant Colonel Timothy Sheehan, Commander Space Force 6SWS; Captain Robert Potter, Commanding Officer CG ASCC; Captain Sean Hannigan, Commanding Officer CG BCC; Colonel Matthew Porter, Commander ARNG Camp Edwards; and Rose Forbes, JBCC IRP Program Manager. Town Manager Mark Ells presented his **Town Manager Communications** for period July 16, 2021 thru August 5, 2021:

 Elizabeth Jenkins, Director of Planning and Development, will provide an update on the Community Meeting held on Monday August 2, 2021 regarding the Proposed Zoning Revisions in Downtown Hyannis.

- 2. Elizabeth Jenkins, Director of Planning and Development, will provide an update on the Local Comprehensive Plan (LCP) Request for Proposal for Consultant Service in support of the LCP.
- 3. The Executive Director of the Alcoholic Beverages Control Commission (ABCC) called to inform us that they are creating a small working group to discuss the various aspects and governance associated with the expansion of Restaurants to outdoors. The Town of Barnstable was asked to participate due to the good work accomplished on Hyannis Main Street in this regard. Elizabeth Hartsgrove, Director of Licensing, will participate on this working group.
- 4. On July 20, 2021 I testified before the PFAS Interagency Task Force as a municipality that is currently addressing the issue of PFAS chemicals in our water resources. This task force has a mission to review and investigate water and ground contamination of per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) across the Commonwealth and to recommend strategies for remediation, education, and mitigation of public health concerns and environmental impacts. My testimony illustrated the specific challenges Barnstable faces with regards to the presence of PFAS chemicals. More broadly the Task Force listened to each community's perspective on the extent of PFAS chemicals in water resources and drinking water supplies, how we are addressing these challenges, and any thoughts on what additional state support or resourcing are needed. Attached is the testimony provided to the task force.
- 5. After last year's hiatus due to the pandemic, we are looking forward to reintroducing this important event.
- 6. We continue to have regular conversations with Vineyard Wind (VW) regarding the status of the Phase I and Phase II VW Projects. VW continues to work with Barnstable staff regarding both Phase I & II of the project. They have commenced construction on Phase I and are proceeding with permitting on Phase II. We have awarded the construction contract for the installation of sewers along the Phase I VW cable route and expect physical construction to commence this fall of 2021. We have continued our discussion with Vineyard Wind regarding an update to the existing Host Community Agreement (HCA) for Phase II and Phase III. I plan to bring forward a resolve authorizing the Town Manager to finalize negotiations and enter into a modified HCA with Vineyard Wind at the August 19, 2021 Town Council meeting.
- 7. The Cape Cod Commission is hosting the seventh annual One Cape Summit on August 23rd and 24th at the Wequassett Resort in Harwich. This year's event will include options for in-person or virtual participation. One Cape will focus on the critical challenges of water quality, climate change, and housing. Over the course of two days, sessions will cover strategies to address marine and freshwater quality, work to mitigate and adapt to climate-related impacts in the region, local and regional strategies to support housing needs, and building resilience within our natural, built, and community systems in a post-COVID economy.
- 8. The Town of Barnstable has initiated a Ponds and Lakes Monitoring and Management Plan in an effort to remedy issues that inhibit the use of our freshwater resources such as excessive nutrients, low dissolved oxygen, cyanobacteria, and invasive species. Our **three-step approach** is as follows:
 - **Step 1:** The Monitoring phase that includes monitoring for water quality, dissolved oxygen conditions, phytoplankton composition (including cyanobacteria), rooted vegetation survey, mussel survey, stormwater and stream inputs and output monitoring (when applicable), and sediment core collection to determine nutrient regeneration from the sediments. The

information is analyzed in conjunction with a watershed assessment, which provides the groundwater related inputs to the pond.

Step 2: Development of a Pond Management Plan Report is done by using the data collected in Step 1. The key components of this report includes: if the pond is impaired due to phosphorus and/or nitrogen loading; which nutrient sources are contributing the impairment; and a list of management scenarios that could be implemented to reduce nutrient inputs and improve water quality conditions. Scenarios often include options that can be taken within the watershed (sewers, advanced Integrated Alternative (IA) systems, storm water reduction, etc.) and within the pond (aeration, alum, dredging, etc.) solutions to reduce nutrient inputs and improve water quality.

Step 3: Implementation occurs once the management plan is complete and has been presented to Town stakeholders to decide which solution(s) will be implemented to improve pond water quality. Preferred/recommended implementation solutions will be presented to Town Council for capital appropriations and operational programming.

Pond Prioritization: The draft prioritization list has been developed by members of DPW, Conservation, Health, and Marine & Environmental Affairs using a set of criteria based on water quality history, cyanobacteria history, level of recreational opportunities (how much our public interacts with a particular pond), etc. to quantify how ponds should be prioritized for management plan development. This prioritization list is a living document which will be updated annually based upon changing conditions and the most recent data. We will keep you advised of our progress on this program.

9. Town Manager will provide an update on Armory renovations project. Presentation attached. Mr. Ells was joined by Finance Director Mark Milne for a discussion about Available Options for General Fund Contribution for the Comprehensive Wastewater Management Plan. OLD BUSINESS began with Town Attorney Karen Nober presenting Agenda Item 2022-002 Supplemental Appropriation Order in the amount of \$15,000 for the purpose of paying operating expenses of the Legal Department for the services of the law firm of Anderson & Kreiger which is serving as outside counsel to the Town with respect to two lawsuits filed against the Town by the Conservation Law Foundation which was approved. **NEW BUSINESS** began with DPW Director Dan Santos presenting Agenda Item 2022-008 Transfer Order in the amount of \$362,885.47 from Town Council Appropriation and Loan Order 2020-106 to Town Council Appropriation and Loan Order 2017-069 for the purpose of funding the Town Hall restroom renovations which was approved. Town Councilor Jessica Rapp Grassetti presented first readings of Agenda Item 2022-009 Appointments to a Board/Committee/Commission: Comprehensive Financial Advisory Board; Golf Committee; Planning Board; and Youth Commission and Agenda Item 2022-010 Reappointments to a Board/Committee/Commission: Old King's Highway Historic District Commission which were referred to Second Readings on August 19, 2021. Agenda Item 2022-011 Appropriation and Transfer Order in the amount of \$2.5 million in Community Preservation Funds to increase the number and availability of community housing units in the Town of Barnstable was referred to a Public Hearing on August 19, 2021. Town Attorney Karen Nober presented Agenda Item 2022-012 Ratification of the Town Council President's appointments to the Appointments Committee of the Town Council which was approved. The next Barnstable Town Council Meeting will be held on Thursday, August 19, 2021 at 7:00 PM via Zoom. The meeting Agenda will be available on the Town of Barnstable's website (www.townofbarnstable.us).

<u>School Committee Meeting – Wednesday, August 5, 2021</u>

The August School Committee kicked off with the School Committee meeting and welcoming the new Barnstable High School Principal, Liz Freedman, to the district. She shared with the Committee what she has been working on this summer and the plans for the new school year. She is planning an 8th grade orientation, as

well as an orientation for last year's remote learning students and any new students entering the high school

this year. There will be a vaccination clinic at the high school on August 20 from 12:00-2:00 PM for all students over the age of 12 and their families. Welcome to Barnstable, Principal Freedman! In her Superintendent's Report, Dr. Mayo-Brown informed the Committee that DESE (Department of Elementary and Secondary Education) and DPH released guidance on face masks in schools this upcoming year. They are strongly recommending students in grades K-6 wear masks when indoors. Unvaccinated students, staff, and visitors in grades 7-12 should wear masks indoors. Vaccinated students and staff are recommended to remain unmasked. Students and staff, regardless of whether they are vaccinated or not, must wear masks while on buses and when in health service offices at school. Masks are not necessary outdoors. Dr. Mayo-Brown stated the Reopening Steering Committee will meet on August 11 discuss the recommendations and make a recommendation to the School Committee regarding the district's mask wearing policy. The School Committee discussed options for the new mascot logo for Barnstable High School. Art students from Barnstable High School had submitted logo ideas this past spring and the Community Engagement Subcommittee worked with Art Department Head Matt Kemp to choose a few designs to move forward. The School Committee decided to survey the students at Barnstable Intermediate School and High School this September to hear their voice for the final decision is made for the new mascot logo for the Barnstable High School RedHawks - stay tuned!



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Downtown Hyannis Zoning Revision



The Town of Barnstable is proposing revisions to the zoning in Downtown Hyannis. The draft zoning amendment and zoning district map is available on the Town's <u>Downtown Hyannis Zoning Revision webpage</u> for public review and comment. During the review period, comments may be submitted via the online forum on the webpage, or submitted directly to staff via e-mail. Planning staff will also be available for virtual office hours on **Monday August 9, 2021 from 4:00 PM to 5:00 PM** via Zoom (Meeting ID 970 9544 6310) for additional questions and comments.

Purpose

The Downtown Hyannis Rezoning effort is a major step towards implementing the goals presented within the Town's Local Comprehensive Plan, Housing Production Plan, and the Growth Incentive Zone Strategic Plan with a particular focus on increasing residential and mixed-use development, and defining specifications for building form and placement that respond to local context through scale, and design considerations. The focus of this effort is to create a predictable regulatory framework that encourages compact residential development,

compatible with traditional development patterns, meeting a range of housing needs. The proposed amendment additionally aligns with modern form-based code techniques which focus on the physical form of development, emphasizing a strong relationship between the building and the broader context, public spaces, streets, surrounding buildings and the use of frontage areas, unlike traditional zoning which predominately focuses on the type of use allowed on the land.




The conceptual illustration above represents the intent of this zoning amendment with a focus on promoting an increase in multi-family and mixed-use density while establishing a stronger relationship between the

development and the greater context through the form and placement of buildings.

Area of Focus

This proposal focuses on downtown Hyannis, the area designated as the Growth Incentive Zone (GIZ), and the existing "Hyannis Village Zoning Districts," all currently served by public sewer and water. Hyannis serves as the regional commercial and transportation hub of the Cape. Achieving a greater density of jobs and housing within the GIZ supports the community's vision of a vibrant, livable, mixed-use, walkable regional center. More dense, compact housing options paired within buildings that respond Hyannis' unique character can support a mix of housing choices for all ages and incomes while encouraging healthier and more sustainable lifestyles.

<u>Town of Barnstable Community Development Block Grant Program</u> Notice of Document Availability, Public Meeting and Public Comment Period

The Town has completed the 2020 program year for the Community Development Block Grant program and is preparing Consolidated Annual Performance Evaluation Report (CAPER) for the period July 1, 2020 – June 30, 2021. The Town was awarded \$286,135 in federal funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to address the goals and objectives of the Town of Barnstable Consolidated Plan for 2020 – 2025. The CAPER is a year-end report that outlines the accomplishments of the Town's CDBG program and is available for review and comment before the Town submits it to HUD for approval.

Barnstable Public Schools Offering Free Summer Meals



Cyanobacteria Notice



As we enter the summer season, we wanted to let you know the Town is planning to resume cyanobacteria monitoring and reporting. However, this program will have a delayed start this year due to unanticipated staff turnover. We expect the program to resume in July. Until this program is back up and running, we wanted to provide some tips to identify cyanobacteria blooms, what to do if you suspect a bloom, and who to contact.

Identifying Cyanobacteria Blooms

How do I know if there is a harmful algal bloom in the water?

Cyanobacteria can cause the water to appear slightly discolored, cloudy, or resemble pea soup or paint. They are usually blue or green but can also be brown or red. They can also give the water a bad odor. The cyanobacteria in some blooms are dispersed throughout the water, while in other blooms they are concentrated in a scum or mat, either on the surface of the water or in sediment along the shoreline.

What if you Suspect a Cyanobacteria Bloom?

WHEN IN DOUBT, STAY OUT!

If you see a possible cyanobacteria bloom, avoid contact with the water.



ROAD WORK UPDATES

As always please slow down and use extreme caution when traveling through the road construction areas and follow posted safety and detour signs.

NEW MassDOT Route 28 & Yarmouth Road Intersection Improvements

Mass Coastal Railroad, through MassDOT, will be making repairs/modifications to the pre-signal traffic lights on Wednesday, August 11th. Work will be completed at night between the hours of 9:00 pm and 5:00 am. This work is important to increase the visibility/ sight lines to the railroad flashers on the cantilever bridge behind the traffic pre-signals. Advanced traffic warning along with a police details will be provided. Please use caution and safe speeds when traveling on this section of Rte. 28 during construction operations.

UPDATED Drainage & Pavement Improvements on Wheeler Road in Marstons Mills

Drainage and pavement improvements on Wheeler Road in Marstons Mills are currently on-going and will continue during the week of August 9, 2021. The remaining work will include the raising of structures to finished grade, final asphalt paving and restoration of all disturbed areas. Please use caution and safe speeds when traveling on Wheeler Road during construction operations.

CONTINUES Rendezvous Lane Wastewater Pump Station Replacement Project

The Town of Barnstable's contractor, Robert B. Our Co., Inc., is under contract to complete a wastewater pump station replacement project at the intersection of Rendezvous Lane, Kent Road and Salten Point Road. The project involves a new below grade precast concrete wet well and valve vault, pumping system, control panel, standby generator and gravity sewer main to replace the existing wastewater pump station at the Town Right of Way to Barnstable Harbor at the end of Rendezvous Lane. The improvements are necessary to replace the

existing pump station approaching the end of its intended service life and to relocate the new pump station above the FEMA base flood elevation. Typical work hours are 7:00 AM to 4:00 PM, with groundwater dewatering pumps and sewer bypass pumps occasionally requiring 24/7 operation. Remaining work includes restoration of disturbed areas.

UPDATED Town Wide Drainage Improvements

The Town's contractor, Tasco Construction, will continue drainage improvements at eight (8) locations along Oldham Road in Osterville the week of 8/9/21. The work includes installation of new drainage systems, repairs to existing drainage systems, adjustment of drainage structure castings, and restoration of any areas disturbed during construction. Normal work hours will be between 7:00 AM to 3:30 PM, Monday through Friday. Through traffic will be maintained throughout construction. Any lane closures will be supported with police details to direct traffic. Motorists are advised to seek alternate routes to avoid the construction work.
