Dear Reader:

I hope this note finds you well and enjoying what's left of our Spring season. Our community just witnessed a Memorial Day weekend full of wonderful events honoring our veterans who have given so much to us and our Country.

Also at the May 16th Town Council meeting, Finance Director Mark Milne and I delivered the FY 2014 Budget Message to the Councilors with the theme of "Emphasizing Basic Values" – public safety, public education, and delivering government services efficiently. We face the same economic challenges confronting other communities and through prudent planning, we are able to address our basic needs. Last year's budget maintained fiscal stability in a changing political environment. In FY 2014, we have again maintained our fiscal stability, achieved modest service enhancements, spent within our means, and prudently planned for our financial future. This message starts the public process with the Council as we work toward adoption of the budget. We will begin our formal budget hearings on June 6th. We have posted the entire budget on our website and placed a copy in all of our Libraries for your review. We are committed to offering the highest quality of services within our budgetary constraints.

We have placed a 4th of July button prominently on the Town's website. We know that a lot of folks are already making plans for this year and this information will provide you with the dates of 4th of July activities taking place around Town.

A couple of updates.

A number of years ago, Town Manager John Klimm was given a gift of two large paintings by Vernon Coleman. These painting were authenticated by his son, Vern Coleman, but they desperately needed cleaning and a home in Town Hall. The CPC and the Town Council agreed to fund cleaning of the paintings and they were recently returned to us. One painting, which is of a beach cottage painted in the 1930's, is now in its home at the end of the hallway on the first floor in Town Hall (opposite the elevator). The second one, which is of a lighthouse painted in the late 1940's or early 1950's, now resides in the Town Clerk's office on the same side of the hall. Anyone is welcome to come in and see them. It is nice to have this continuation of the Coleman art flow from the WPA mural in the center of the hall, to the paintings in the Tax office and now these. A lovely piece of art history from our own community right here in Town Hall.


dogs....but as always - all entries are the best in the eyes of the owners. Thanks for entering and being our Number 1 dog for the year!!!

Superintendent's Corner

The end of the school year is quickly approaching and what a year it has been. Our theme for the 2012-2013 school year was "Challenges and Changes" and it was quite evident that both were in abundant supply!

The most significant challenge and change this year was the introduction of the new educator evaluation system. The evaluation system is used by every educator who is certified by the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education encompassing staff from teacher to administrator to superintendent. It is a 5-step cycle involving:

- * Self-Assessment
- * Analysis, Goal Setting & Plan Development
- * Implementation of the Plan
- * Formative Assessment/Evaluation
- * Summative Evaluation

The purpose of the evaluation system is to place student learning at the center using multiple measures of student learning, growth and achievement, to promote growth and development of leaders and teachers and to shorten timelines for improvement. My appreciation to all of our teachers and administrators who have put in countless hours to understand and use the new system.

Another change this year involved new leadership. Barnstable United Elementary has a new interim principal, Rosemary Williams, and two new vice principals, Dale Forest and Robert Donehey. They have guided the school during the transition from a charter school and will continue next school year. We also saw new leadership at our Pre-Kindergarten (PK) program. Matthew Scheufele, the principal of Centerville Elementary, now oversees the PK program. We thank Dave Thomas for his leadership in the program prior to Matt and wish him well in his future endeavors.

One of the challenges this year also involved New England Association of Schools and Colleges (NEASC) re-accreditation of our high school. Accreditation has two fundamental purposes: to assure the quality of the institution and to assist in the improvement of the institution. It is a rigorous review of the organization, staffing, resources and ability to accomplish its objectives. Hats off to the high school staff for completing the two year process.

To finish off our year of challenges and changes, we have undergone significant shifts in our curriculum. Massachusetts joined the Common Core State Standards Initiative in 2009. The initiative is a state-led process to develop common English language arts and math standards among 46 state and 2 U.S. territories. All districts in Massachusetts have undergone a thorough review of its curriculum to align it to the Common Core. In Barnstable, we have created a curriculum/lesson plan template for grades K-3 and will continue that work until all grade levels are complete. My thanks to our Assistant Superintendent, Marie McKay, and many others who contributed to this effort.

As the school year comes to a close, we all await the summer season. Though our work continues year-round, warmer weather, time to spend with family and friends and time to recharge are all things we look forward to doing. I am proud of our school system for weathering the challenges this year and look forward to continuing our work next year.

Summer is a time for school classrooms and hallways to empty and the awaited anticipation of our children's fun and play time.

Yet, emergency rooms across the country call summertime 'the trauma season for kids.'

From the heat to pools to bike riding, parents need to be on alert.

This summer children ages 14 and under will be rushed to emergency rooms nearly 3 million times for serious injuries resulting from motor vehicle crashes, drowning, bike crashes, pedestrian incidents, falls and other hazards. More than 2.500 children will die.

Tragedies rise and nearly half (40 percent) of all unintentional injury-related deaths occur during the summer months (May to August) because children are supervised less, have more free time and are involved in more outdoor activities. While you relax this summer, summer is not the time to relax about safety. Close supervision, proper protective gear, and other simple prevention steps will help keep your child safe.

Trauma is preventable. Keeping your children out of the emergency room takes thought and preparation.

Heat can kill. Children are smaller than adults and they dehydrate quicker. When kids play, they sweat. They should not be out in the heat for more than 30 minutes. Bring them inside for at least 15 minutes for water and snacks.

Insect Bites can be dangerous. Bugs also enjoy the outdoors. These creepy crawly, biting, stinging pests don't have to be such a pain if parents discourage children from getting excited and moving rapidly when they see insects - movement encourages insects to bite. Keep sugary foods and trash cans away from outside play and eating areas and avoid sweets during picnics - unless water is accessible to rinse off sticky areas after eating.

Sun Tips to Prevent Skin Cancer in Later Life. There are many steps you can take to reduce your child's exposure to the sun's rays. Sunscreens, wide brimmed hats, protective clothing and sun avoidance (between the hours of 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.) are important for maximum sun protection. Sunscreens should be viewed as a back-up to primary means of sun protection such as shirts, hats and sun avoidance. Always reapply sunscreen - even if it's waterproof - immediately after coming out of the water.

Barbecue Safely...

Use all barbecue grills away from the house in the backyard. Supervise children yever any grill is in use. Never use gasoline on any grill!





Gas Grills...

Keep all LP-gas outside, 10 feet away from building openings such as doors, windows, dryer vents and 20 feet away from air intake vents and all ignition sources. All LP-gas cylinders with a capacity between 4-40 lbs. must be equipped with an overfill protection device. LP-gas grills are not permitted inside at all or on balconies above the first floor of any building where people live. LP-gas is heavier than air and sinks. A leaky grill could pose a hazard to people below. Possible ignition sources include smoking materials, air conditioners, compressors, pilot lights and cars. Make sure all connections are tight and secure.



Fireworks...

Enjoy the many professional, supervised fireworks displays. The possession and use of all fireworks by private citizens is <u>illegal</u> in Massachusetts. This includes sparklers, party poppers, snappers, firecrackers and cherry bombs, to name a few. It is illegal to purchase fireworks in another state and transport them into Massachusetts. Do not purchase fireworks through mail-order catalogues. Government cannot prohibit distribution of these catalogues, but police do confiscate illegal shipments of fireworks. Many consumers attempting to circumvent the law have lost both their money and their fireworks.

Difficulty: This is a strenuous, two-hour, 3 mile walk.







11th annual Fun-Filled Clamming Classes for Kids



Barnstable's Natural Resources Program will offer three FREE shellfishing classes for young people:

SATURDAY JUNE 22ND @ 4:00PM at Bridge St. Landing, Osterville SUNDAY JUNE 23RD @ 5:00PM at Bridge St. Landing, Osterville WEDNESDAY JUNE 26TH @ 8:00AM at Bridge St. Landing, Osterville

- All youngsters must be accompanied by an adult who must have a current 2013 Town of Barnstable Shellfish License to harvest shellfish that day.
- Natural Resources staff and town shellfish volunteers will be available to assist any young digger who wants the help.
- Be prepared to get wet! The shellfish live in wet sand that gets covered by saltwater when the tide is high. Waders, hip boots or knee boots would be helpful. Protective gloves are necessary.
- Shellfish may be taken by hand or rake. Small (garden) hand rakes and trowels will be allowed for the young diggers.
- Attendees will receive a free "Clammer Kid" badge and an activity booklet.
- Shellfish that are legally harvested may be taken home.
- Certificates of Completion for this Clamming Class for Kids will be handed out as you leave.
- SHELLFISH REGULATIONS APPLY AS ALWAYS!

The comfort and safety of participating youngsters is the responsibility of the accompanying adult guardian.
